Therefore the next newsletter will be June or July. We have however put the latest news regarding scarecrows on page seven in this newsletter to give as much information as we have to hand for members of the public to be able to start with their scarecrow and make this year better than last year,

Children living in and around New Houghton will soon have a new place for fun and adventure.

Pleasley Parish Council has placed the order for a new, fully accessible playground in the public park on Rotherham Road.

It will replace the current one as its equipment is now obsolete and does not meet current health and safety standards.

Work to install the new equipment started February 2011 and it is anticipated it will be completed before the end of April 2011.

The scheme is costing in the region of £60,000 and funds have come from several sources: Lafarge Aggregates which has awarded a grant of £10,000 through the Landfill Communities Fund, the **Parish Council has provided £10,000** and The Veolia Environmental Trust, has also awarded a grant of £39,000 through the Landfill Communities Fund.

The new play equipment will include climbing structures for both toddlers and youths, exciting surf and basket swings and a roundabout that can be used by disabled users.

New safety surfacing will also be laid and the area landscaped. Fencing, seating and bins will also be installed along with self-closing gates to keep dogs out.

The scheme is being project managed by Groundwork Creswell, Ashfield and Mansfield. They have worked with the Parish Council to consult local residents about what they wanted to see featured in the new play area.

The feedback has influenced the final design.



Speaking about the work, the Chairman of the Parish Council, Councillor Howard Wright, said, "It's great that this project is now underway after many years of planning. The new playground will be a vital resource for the area and the whole community is looking forward to it being opened.

I am also very pleased that much of the work will involve local trainees who are looking for employment and developing their skills on Groundwork training programmes."

Questionnaires have gone out to families in the Pleasley area asking for ideas for the next scheme which is Terrace Lane Pleasley.

Kissingate Leisure Centre Shirebrook is opening its doors to welcome people onto the badminton courts as part of a new 'Bring a Friend for Free promotion'.

Bolsover District Council has teamed up with England's 'No Strings Badminton' programme – a relaxed, social 'pay and play' session-based initiative aimed at adults of any age or ability - to offer anyone who attends the session on Wednesday between 8-10pm, the opportunity to invite up to 4 friends free to experience the fun on court activity.

This will run from **1 April 2011 to 31 May 2011**,

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

At the February Parish Council meeting the Chairman, Cllr Howard Wright, called for a minute's silence for Barbara Smith who had recently died. She had been a parish councillor for many years until she had to retire through ill health.

District Councillor Brian Murray-Carr gave a report on the West View children's home following complaints received regarding the behaviour of certain resident children. He assured council that this problem had been rectified. He would report to the Parish Council the outcome of a meeting he was to have with Nottingham County Council.

PC Browett gave his report on crime figures for the past month. There were 16 in total: Criminal Damage 3, Acts of Violence 7, Theft from a motor vehicle 1, Interference with a motor vehicle 1, Dwelling Burglary 2, Non Dwelling Burglary 2.

Hanging baskets will once again adorn the lamp posts throughout the parish. These will be purchased by the Parish Council and supplied by Glapwell Nurseries who do a marvellous job of watering every day.

Renewal Scheme

Concern was raised about the work on the Renewal Scheme at New Houghton, after several complaints had been made. The Parish Council sympathises with these residents but unfortunately does not have any control over this project.

Bolsover District Council is currently working on plans to carry out improvements to the rear access road between Crompton and Verney Street.

The rear access roads are privately owned and are not the responsibility of either the District or County.

However, environmental improvements are considered an important part of renewal work and hence the intention to carry out access road improvements.

The ownership of this road is currently being researched, but it is quite common for each property owner to own a piece of the road.

The Council will then contact all of the owners involved and request permission from all of these owners before works can commence.

In respect of Group Repair, work on the next block of properties on Devonshire Street is due to commence.

All owners involved in this phase of works should have now received their information packs and are being asked to sign up to the scheme.

Once all the applications are complete, the contractors will be instructed to commence and the works will be completed over the coming months. A further report will be in our next newsletter.

Residents at the bottom of Portland Street are still waiting for the road surface to be repaired. This has been reported yet again along with the various potholes in the parish to be done. The County Council has been reminded of its slogan 'You Report It' 'We will Sort it'.

In answer to the poem written by J H Wells sent in by Alan Beech, a New Houghton lad now living in Rotherham, who wanted to know if anyone knew of J H Wells, the following letter was received by Cllr Howard Wright. He will let Alan Beech know of the outcome.

"Hello. I am writing to you in relation to a poem by J.H. Wells. in the Pleasley Parish Council Newsletter - February 2011.

This poem could have been written by Joe Hermon Wells who was born in New Houghton in 1894. He was the youngest child of Joseph Wells and Eliza. 1911 census shows him living with his parents at 218 Newhoughton. Joe's elder sister Sarah Wells and her husband Albert Slaney are my great grandparents.

They lived in New Houghton (I think on Portland St.) until Sarah died in 1944. Joseph Hermon had a colourful life on the stage with his second wife Mary Martin.

He died in Morecambe Lancashire in 1985.

I also knew Alan Beech when he was a bandsman - he would know me as Carol Evans." from Carol Gascoigne.

Councillor Wright replied to Carol and thanked her very much for this enlightening news.

It was interesting to see how the houses were numbered in the 19th Century. It was just 218 New Houghton before the streets were named Portland and Devonshire Streets.

Following the recent nostalgic memory of New Houghton there has been another request from bygone days this time from Carol Pearson nee Boulton who wants to know if anyone has a particular photo taken in the 1940's of Pleasley Colliery Brass Band. This photo used to hang in the Doctor's Surgery when the Surgery was on Pit Lane from 1950 to 1960. This photograph shows her father Syd Boulton who played the big drum. He lived in New Houghton until 1953 before he moved to Shirebrook where he died in 1989. Mrs Pearson is anxious to obtain this photograph of her father. Can anyone help?

HEALTH NOTES and HERBS

We see much advice on what to eat and what is good for ailments - many old fashioned remedies passed down from generations, do they work? We know some of them do, having tried them. When modern medicine doesn't appear to help, perhaps some are worth trying - it's a case of common sense. If you don't think they will be harmful some people will be willing to try. There is also a lot of things to eat which will do good, The following foods are not amongst these useful remedies. We will look at these first. They have certain problems that many people do not know about; one thing that should be treated with respect is mushrooms. Our fathers may have picked them but I would only eat what I buy from the shops.

MUSHROOMS.

While mushrooms available in most supermarkets should be pretty safe to eat, mushroom fans need to be careful about what species they are consuming as many varieties can be highly **dangerous and even fatal**. Around 100 species of mushrooms are said to be dangerous to humans, with symptoms ranging from headaches to seizures or even death. In 2010 a small variety of mushroom called the Little White was blamed for an estimated 400 deaths in China. So beware.

Chillies

Chillies are renowned for their heat, which is what makes them so popular. However, it is actually the chemical that causes this spiciness (capsaicin) which can cause toxic effects such as stomach pain, itchy skin and, in extreme cases, death. For most people eating chillies will do little harm, however capsaicin is best eaten sparingly so make sure to take it easy and avoid any chilli eating challenges!

RAPESEED OIL

There has been much controversy about this seemingly innocent natural oil, but the general consensus seems to be that it could have many negative implications on our health. Reports state that the rape plant - from which the oil is produced - is extremely toxic, and side effects of consuming its oil could include respiratory problems and blindness.

Rice

It is impossible to dispute that rice has many great health benefits. However, like with most things, it may be best eaten in moderation due to its reportedly unsafe levels of arsenic. One study has suggested that one in five packs of American long-grain rice contain potentially harmful levels of the toxic substance, while others have reported concern for the levels of arsenic in rice milk and baby rice. While there is relatively little risk of the odd bowl of rice causing any long lasting harm, the consumption of high levels of arsenic has been linked to cancer.

Potatoes

The common potatoes may look innocent enough, but did you know they actually come from the same family as poisonous plant the deadly nightshade? Although they are not quite as dangerous as this family member, potatoes do pose certain risks to our health due to them containing toxic compounds known as glycoalkaloids,

the most worrying of which is solanine which affects the nervous and digestive systems, causing headaches, weakness, confusion, diarrhoea and vomiting.

Poisoning from potatoes occurs very rarely but fans of the popular vegetable should take measures to protect themselves by avoiding potatoes with sprouts - which tend to have a higher concentration of glycoalkaloids - and those which have turned green. Although the green colour of the potatoes is harmless in itself, it does indicate that the potatoes have been exposed to light, which can also encourage solanine levels to rise over the safe level for consumption.

One of the modern failings is packing potatoes in plastic bags. Exposed to the light potatoes soon turn green if not used. Years ago it was a common fact to pack potatoes in brown paper bags to prevent this happening.

CUCUMBER

Cucumbers are best known as a natural diuretic that help promote the flow of urine and also protect against urinary bladder disease. In addition to vitamin C and fibre, cucumbers provide vitamin A, magnesium, potassium, iron and calcium. The two natural compounds, ascorbic acid and caffeic acid they contain, can help prevent water retention - this is why people place cold cucumber slices on their eyes to help reduce puffiness.

Aloe Vera. Often called the Miracle Plant, it has many medicinal and healing properties for burns and was used by Egyptian Queens in their quest for beauty and Alexander the Great to treat battle wounds.

Two important **national issues** every person in the parish of Pleasley should be aware of, and two local issues. These issues could well have an impact on lives not only now but on lives of our children and future residents, these issues are:

The census and the referendum on AV, and locally the voting for District Both on May 5th.

The census is self explanatory, or is it?

First we will take the referendum on AV. The government has promised the that the people of our nation can vote on this controversial issue.

You ask what is AV?

AV is alternative voting whereby a candidate who does not achieve above 50% of the votes isn't declared the winner, which doesn't make sense. On your voting paper you have to select your candidates in order of preference, who you want to win, who you prefer for second choice say, who you prefer for third choice and so on,

Candidate 'A' receives 48% Clear Favourite, candidate 'B' 30% candidate 'C' 12% candidate 'D' 6% candidate 'E' 4%. Candidate 'A' hasn't won the 50% required.

Because in the first place you had a choice of putting candidates in the order of preference the one with the least votes is eliminated, his votes go to whoever those 4% chose for second, say it was 'B'

He now stands at 34% still no one has above 50% so the one with the least votes is eliminated again, which is 'D' second choice of those 6% is 'B' their votes go to 'B' that now gives him 40%.

The next lowest is the 12% if their second choice is split 1% to .A. 11% to B he will now have accumulated 51% he will be announced the winner, 49%to 51%.

The second important issue.

Referendum and District Council Elections - Thursday 5th May 2011

(As there are no elections for the Pleasley Parish Council, you will still be required to vote to decide on the AV voting system and District Councillors)

On 5th May 2011, a Referendum on the proposed Alternative Voting system and the District and Parish Elections will be held in Bolsover district.

Referendum on the Alternative Voting System

This will be an opportunity for those people eligible to vote in UK Parliamentary Elections to have their say on whether the voting system to elect Members of Parliament in the UK should be changed.

This will be a simple Yes/No choice and you will be able to vote at your local polling station or by post, depending on the arrangements you have requested. Contact Democratic Services to check if you are registered to vote or telephone 01246 242424.

The Chair of the Electoral Commission, Jenny Watson, has been appointed as the Chief Counting Officer for the Referendum. Information on the Alternative Voting System can be found at aboutmyvote.gov.uk.

CRIMESTOPPERS

Officers from Derbyshire Constabulary's Safer Neighbourhood Teams and Roads Policing Unit are to target criminals and scrap metal dealers. Police are asking residents to be extra vigilant and contact the police if they see anyone acting suspiciously with cutting type equipment near to parked vehicles.

Offenders have removed the **catalytic converters from two 4x4 vehicles** parked on the street. A number of catalytic converters have been stolen from vehicles. All scrap metal dealers in the area were also checked for any stolen goods and to help officers gain information about potential criminals.

Dozens of vehicles were stopped and checked for stolen items and drivers checked against national intelligence systems.

24 reports for no vehicle excise licences, one arrest for driving whilst disqualified and 15 fixed penalty notices being issued for not wearing seatbelts and using mobile phones while driving.

Ten vehicles checked were also deemed not roadworthy and the owners were issued with prohibition notices. This means they must remove the vehicle from the road immediately and they are not allowed back on the road until the vehicle has passed an MOT.

Police in Bolsover are cracking down on drugs across the district. Officers discovered 22 suspected cannabis plants and hydroponics setup in the loft of a house in Shirebrook. Officers from the Bolsover Safer Neighbourhood Teams also carried out two warrants in the area based on information from the community. The first was executed at a house on **Devonshire Street, New Houghton** on Monday, March 14 where they found cannabis and prescription drugs. A 48-year-old man and a 32-year old woman were arrested on suspicion of possession of Class B drugs. They are currently on bail.

The officers in Glapwell Safer Neighbourhood Team have been working alongside the local community to set policing priorities for the next three months. These are:
Anti-social behaviour caused by groups of youths on **Rotherham Road, New Houghton** and Speeding on the A617 between Doe Lea and Glapwell
The top tips from former burglars include:

Potential burglars will always try the door first; if it is locked they may then move on to another house. Make sure your door is locked.

Burglars will target properties with wooden, rather than UPVC windows as they are easier to get open at night without making too much noise.

Keep valuable property out of sight from passers by. If they can see items such as car keys, laptops or handbags then they will decide to try and get in. Make sure these items are never on view.

Never leave valuable items on show or leave your keys downstairs, take them upstairs at night time.

Metal posts on driveways, which prevent cars from being driven away, will put off a burglar.
