Terrace Lane Recreation Ground, Pleasley – Playground improvements.

PRESS RELEASE BY VEOLIA ENVIRONMENTAL TRUST.

“The popular play area on Terrace Lane Recreation Ground, Pleasley, is going to be revamped thanks to Pleasley Parish Council being awarded a grant of £49,185 by The Veolia Environmental Trust.

Much of the existing play equipment has become unsafe and unfit for purpose and has been removed by the Parish Council. New equipment will now be installed and the area will be landscaped and resurfaced.

The new play structures will encourage positive interactions and safe play opportunities for a range of ages and abilities. A picnic site will also be created and trees and shrubs will be planted in the area.

The grant was awarded by our Board at its recent quarterly meeting, where it awarded a total of £1.2m to 47 projects across the UK.

The grant awarded to Pleasley Parish Council means that the amount awarded over the past five years to projects in Derbyshire now totals £670,225.

We award grants to community and environmental projects through the Landfill Community Fund.

Our objects team will now start the process of working with the parish council to develop their final plans. Work can start once this has been done.”

The Executive Director of The Veolia Environmental Trust, McNabb Laurie, adds

“Over £650,000 spent in Derbyshire in the last five years, and I am so glad to see another award being made for free and open use by the public.”



Councillor Howard Wright Chairman of Pleasley Parish Council says, “It is great that we have been awarded this grant which means we are one step closer to

creating a safe and stimulating play area which can be enjoyed by all the community. We look forward to the work getting started,

The Parish Council has contributed **£10,000** towards this project”.



Councillor Howard Wright presided over the **Annual Parish Meeting** before the Annual Parish Council meeting on Monday 13th May 2013 in

which he confirmed the annual precept of £75,000. He then gave his report.

There were six members of the public in attendance.

In the open forum, Derek Betts, representing the Millennium Green Trustees, explained the current position of the trustees and asked the Parish Council for help.

The Chairman advised Mr Betts to write to the Parish Council so that the issue could be discussed by the Parish Council.

Mrs Val Gamble spoke on behalf of the St Michael's church thanking the Parish Council for its support and the donations received in the past for the flower festival. Mrs Gamble also gave details of the Pleasley Surgery Patients' Group.

Mr W Barker reported that two street lights had been removed from Terrace Lane during the recent work by the Electric Board, the Chairman said he would pursue this with County Council's street lighting services. **(The Chairman has been informed they will be replaced ASAP.)**

The annual Parish Council meeting followed. The first item on the agenda was to elect the Chairman for the following year 2013/14. It was resolved that Councillor Howard Wright be re-elected as Chairman, Councillor Pauline Bowmer was re-elected as Vice Chair.

In the Public Participation Mrs Margaret Lawton of Phoenix Rise spoke concerning an article which appeared in the newsletter, A discussion took place and it was indicated on the part of the Parish Council that it was not intended to cause any offence and the Parish Council apologises for any offence that may have been caused. The article was unfortunately taken out of context. A letter has been sent to Mrs Lawton apologising for any offence caused.

There have been several complaints regarding the condition of the Millennium Green, and quite rightly so, this is not a good impression for New Houghton. Evidently the Millennium Green Committee of trustees no longer exists and the Secretary Mr Betts is looking for help regarding the future maintenance. He has yet to write in to the parish council and district council with suggestions.

Options currently open to Trusts seeking alternatives to their continued management alone include.

1. Parish Councils Sole Trustees— enables Parish Councils to take on trusteeship and grant liability from an existing Trust; an approach exists for this.
2. Local Authority (BDC) Sole Trustee— enables the Local Authority to take on trusteeship and grant liability from an existing Trust; an approach also exists for this.
3. Sole corporate Trustees— where a company limited by guarantee is formed; the Trust itself remains and is still responsible for the Greens management.

I think if it ceases to be what it was intended for and no trustees are found it reverts back to Natural England.

At a special parish council meeting held on Monday 28th, Mr Derek Gelsthorpe from Terrace Lane Pleasley was interviewed to fill the vacancy of parish councillor and was accepted by a full majority. Your parish councillors are listed below.

Police Report.

At the May Parish Meeting the Police reported seven crime figures.

- 2 Criminal Damage.
- 1 Dwelling burglary
- 1 Non dwelling burglary
- 1 Attempted dwelling burglary
- 1 Robbery
- 1 Assault.

A burglary occurred at a business on Glapwell Lane , Glapwell, overnight between Thursday 27th and Friday 28th June. The offender forced a perimeter fence and took around 500 conifers.

Since the start of May there have been six reports where items have been stolen from vehicles, Valuables including sat-navs, tools and alcohol have been stolen. The most recent incident happened between 8am and 8.45am on Thursday, May 9. A Ford Transit was broken into on Main Street at Palterton.

Inspector Russ Dakin, of the Community Safety unit, said: “These incidents are a reminder that even though crime has fallen, it is still important to always make sure your vehicle is secure whenever you leave it unattended.

“We would also ask that, whenever possible, you remove any items that are valuable and take them with you.”

“Please be aware of this type of incident and if you notice anyone acting suspiciously around vehicles then please contact us.”

Anyone with information should contact Derbyshire police on 101, the non emergency number, or call Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111. **Remember Non Emergency Dial 101.**

Inspector Russ Dakin, said: “The number of house burglaries tends to rise during the summer months as opportunistic thieves take advantage of people who leave their homes insecure while in the garden or in another part of the house.

“We would like to remind people just to remember to keep their doors and windows closed and locked if they are outside, upstairs or even overnight. Reduce the opportunities for a thief to get into your home.”

Keeping windows are closed at night time, even when you are in bed and investing in window locks for ground floor windows.

This is the time of year some of us may get stung by an angry bee, what do we do? First, panic of what might happen and do not know what to do, Pharmaceutical Remedy Survivor Gel Stik, the more common one is After Bite these contain benzocaine the anaesthetic that powers toothache medicines to deaden the nerve endings, so that symptoms are not transmitted to the brain. E45 Itch Relief Stopping Cream supposed to work by suppressing the symptom-producing agents, called histamines, that are released into the body during an allergic response. You may not have these in your medicine cupboard and they are 50% effective. Much better and more effective is Calamine lotion with an analgesic, this pain- and itch-killer calms symptoms with a soothing tingle. This takes time to work but does stop the pain returning after a while, you will want to repeat the treatment. Other home remedies and much cheaper and more effective are slice of raw onion or better still crushed garlic, a paste of vinegar and baking soda. This is very good, also meat tenderizer, which contains papaya, an enzyme found in papaya. This breaks down the toxins in bee (and other) venom. Another very useful and quick remedy is toothpaste. The glycerine found in most toothpaste dries out the venom concentrated under the sting area and the alkaline in some toothpaste neutralizes the acid in the bee's venom. Another method is ice which reduces the swelling. Its flaw, of course is the temperature, some kind of buffer should be used as the ice might burn the skin. Then there is the old favourite, break part of leaf from an Aloe Vera plant.

Congratulations

Congratulations to the pupils and staff of Shirebrook Academy for the successful visit of OFSTED inspectors in March. The academy has been given "**outstanding**" in all areas. Ian Thomas, Strategic Director for Children and Younger Adults for Derbys CC, said "this is the best report I have ever read".

Congratulations also to pupils and staff at Anthony Bek who received "**good**" following their inspection in April. One notable point from Shirebrook's report is that performance has been outstanding, yet at the same time: "Students' literacy levels are particularly low on entry" and "When students join the academy, most are working significantly below the nationally expected standards for their ages in most subjects." Anthony Bek's OFSTED report in 2009 said "Children start at the school with knowledge and skills that are well below average", and the current report says "When children start in Nursery, many have skills and understanding below the levels expected for their age"

What can parents, carers, grandparents etc do to give young children the best possible start?

Government research shows that "*For all children, the quality of the home learning environment is more important for intellectual and social development than parental occupation, education or income.* **What parents do is more important than who parents are.** Examples of a good home learning environment include reading to a child, teaching songs and nursery rhymes, playing with letters and numbers, visiting the library, painting and drawing, emphasising the alphabet." Apparently, TV and videos, known as "overheard speech" are no substitute for parental attention. Real interaction with the child is crucial to crack the code of speech.

Continued OFSTED Report.

Anthony Bek's last OFSTED report in **2013**

Overall effectiveness was good. Achievement of pupils is Good. As a result of good teaching, pupils make good progress to the end of Year 6 from their starting points in the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Quality of teaching Good. Pupils' behaviour and safety of pupils is Good. Pupils say they feel safe in school and also have a good understanding of keeping safe. Leadership and Management are Good.

The leadership of the head teacher, in particular, inspires all the staff in striving to achieve the best for their pupils.

However, it is not yet an outstanding school because the quality of teaching is not yet outstanding, so rates of progress are not consistent.

There are sometimes weakness in teachers' questioning skills, the level of challenge in pupils work, the quality of marking and the provision of opportunities for pupils to assess their own work.

Apart from the senior staff, many leaders are new to their roles and are not yet having an impact on teaching or pupils' achievement.

Action plans do not consistently identify exactly what is to be done, by when, or how much improvement is expected.

The achievement of pupils is good.

What does the School need to improve from Good to Outstanding?
 Raise the quality of teaching to outstanding so that pupils achievements is outstanding.
 Develop the leadership skills of all leaders by providing adequate training

Why is the Community Save a Life Scheme so important?

The Community Save a Life Scheme aims to teach Emergency Life Support Skills to as many people as possible in the community.

Emergency Life Support (ELS), is the set of actions required to help keep someone alive until professional help arrives. It includes performing Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) as well as how to deal with choking and serious bleeding.

Life threatening emergencies are common, but many more people can be saved if simple skills are performed immediately by someone nearby.

STATISTICS

Around **140,000** people in the UK suffer a Heart Attack.

Many of these people will suffer cardiac arrest and die before reaching hospital.

Without resuscitation, cardiac arrest is **ALWAYS FATAL**.

Performing CPR immediately can double a person's chances of survival In 2010 there were **25,960** fatalities from heart attacks.

Had there been just **one** person at the scene with life-saving skills these figures could have been different.

In 2010 **316** people choked to death on food or stomach contents. Again, if there had been just one person with simple life saving skills at each of these incidents the outcomes could potentially have differed significantly.

This scheme endorses the suggestion by Cllr N Jordon regarding an AED which is a portable electronic device that automatically diagnoses and treats life threatening cardiac arrhythmias through the application of electrical therapy, allowing the heart to re-establish an effective rhythm.

AEDs are easy to use and could be the best investment ever make.

These could be placed in public places ready for use in emergencies, people could be trained to use them. When you buy an AED from St John Ambulance, they will train one person to use it and perform CPR absolutely free.

NHS CHANGES:

CLINICAL COMMISSIONING GROUPS

From **April 2013**, groups of GPs and other key healthcare professionals are responsible for around 80% of the healthcare budget in their area. They will plan and pay for services for the local population in that area. There will be 6 Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs) in Nottinghamshire.

Although situated in Derbyshire, Pleasley Surgery is part of the Mansfield and Ashfield Clinical Commissioning Group along with 30 other GP practices. These practices are then organised into 'Federated Groups'. Pleasley Surgery belongs to the '**Vantage Point**' group along with Oak Tree Lane Surgery, Oakwood Surgery, Bull Farm Surgery, Meden Medical Services and Riverbank Medical Services.

The CCGs will buy services from the hospitals, ambulance service and community services providers.

Each CCG has a governing Board which is responsible for making decisions about healthcare after consultation. The Board includes GPs, nurses, hospital doctors, other healthcare professionals and patient representatives.
